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Sunshine Canyon Landfill Update

Sunshine Canyon, located in the Santa Susana Mountains, used to be an entirely idyllic place. Marge Feinberg included Sunshine Canyon as part of the Rim of the Valley in her original thesis. However, Sunshine Canyon was not made an official part of the Rim of the Valley Trail, perhaps due in no small part to the lobbying of commercial landfill interests, specifically that of Browning Ferris Industries (BFI).

For years now, BFI has operated a landfill in Sunshine Canyon. When the City portion of the landfill was at capacity, BFI won approval to use the non-City portion of their land, the L.A. County portion. That landfill has been in production on County land since the mid-1990s and has five or more years of use.

Recently, BFI has been proposing to reopen the old City landfill and build a new landfill on top of it. Unfortunately, the original landfill was *unlined*, which has caused worry about toxic pollution percolating down into the ground and someday reaching the Los Angeles Reservoir, downhill from Sunshine Canyon.

The Los Angeles Reservoir services most of Los Angeles County and adjacent counties. If this *toxic punch* ever reaches it, Metropolitan Water District officials have declared that reservoir water could not be cured of the contamination.

With a potential crisis that could deprive us of one of our main sources of water, due to the shortcomings of past landfill technology, how does BFI have the termerity to advocate piling more landfill on top of what is already a disaster?

California Environment & Park Bond Acts

Although there are numerous State Senate and Assembly bills "in the hopper" to place propositions on the ballot in the year 2000, the most likely will be a combination of Senate Bill 57 (Hayden/Murray) and Assembly Bill 18 (Villaraigosa/Keeley) which will provide about \$2 billion. SB 57 currently provides:

- \$460 million for regional resources (open spaces, farmland and scenic protections, regional trails, unique properties, habitats, and urban amenities, for these areas.
 - a. \$125 million for Southern California,
 - b. \$50 million for the Inland Empire,
 - c. \$60 million for the San Francisco Bay Area,
 - d. \$50 million for the great central valley,
 - e. \$50 million for the Sierra Nevadas,
 - f. \$25 million for Lake Tahoe, and
 - g. \$100 million for the coast.
- 2. \$500 million for local parks.
- 3. \$500 million for the State park system.
- \$100 million for zoos, aquariums, historic presentations, etc.
- 5. \$440 million for fish and wildlife.

This provides \$50 million for the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy, with \$30 million for the Rim of the Valley Corridor (including the Simi Hills and Santa Susanas), and \$20 million for the Los Angeles River.

However, we need about \$35 million for critical purchases in the Simi Hills and Santa Susana Mountains to make sure that the wildlife corridors between the Los Padres and Angeles National Forests and the Santa Monica Mountains are maintained to allow wildlife to migrate back and forth. Moreover, there are great scenic values, etc., in the regions that need to be acquired.

A key problem is that while a majority of the state's population resides south of the Tehachapis, this part of the state will not receive even one half of the funds from the proposed bond issue for many reasons, some of which are historical (for example,

items 3 and 5 above are heavily weighted towards Northern California.

Please contact Senator Hayden and Speaker Villaraigosa requesting a more equitable distribution of the funds. Point out the critical opportunities will be lost in Southern California due to the press of potential development of presently open spaces.

Last month I encouraged members to contact Councilman Bernson's office to express their feelings on the development of a Concept Study for Chatsworth Nature Preserve/Reservoir — thinking that the calls would be counted as showing support for preserving the area as permanent open space.

Councilman Bernson has worked hard for many years to keep the Nature Preserve undeveloped; he is, in fact, responsible for officially changing the name from Chatsworth Reservoir to Chatsworth Nature Preserve/Reservoir.

Your time and energy is better spent calling Mayor Riordan and DWP Commissioner President Rick Caruso to express your concerns in keeping the Nature Preserve undeveloped. I apologize to Councilman Bernson and any persons who took the time to call his office.

Instead, if at all possible, ground conditions uphill from the L.A. Reservoir should be ameliorated. No further action that might jeopardize the reservoir should be allowed. If BFI somehow manages to start up production on top of the old City landfill, there should be no doubt in anyone's mind that a major reservoir for the Los Angeles area is in danger.

Nearby residents fear more pollution from the dust and diesel exhaust fumes produced by more BFI trucks, as well as dust from added landfill activity. Increased airborne pollution will also affect the Los Angeles Reservoir downwind of the landfill. The reservoir is uncovered, open to the dust and fly-away trash from trucks traveling the road adjacent to it. High winds also carry dust and other pollution down to the reservoir from the landfill.

As part of its planned expansion onto City land, BFI also wants to move into untouched acres of woodland nearby. If its wish is granted, Black Walnut woodlands will be gone, acres of Coast Live Oaks will have disappeared, and two populations of Mariposa Lilies will have been transplanted.

Wildlife will also be impacted. Ten *sensitive* (endangered or potentially endangered) species have been observed on the site, including lizards and birds like the White-Tailed Kite and the Yellow Warbler. One of the potential impacts listed in the L.A. City Planning Commission staff report was that *active* raptor (eagles, hawks, etc.) nests may be removed (active, meaning nests with eggs!).

Zoning for the land has already been changed from agricultural to heavy industrial and the Planning Commission recently gave its approval to the project. Two more hearings, before the PLUM Committee of the City Council and the entire City Council, have not as yet been scheduled.

Stage Coach Trail Hikes


