

The de la Ossa Relay Station

Hunt through most early Los Angeles history books and chances are the name de la Ossa will not be found. Yet this family was one of the first to settle in the San Fernando Valley, to run a stagecoach stop at "El Cino" (Encino), and later run a relay station in Chatsworth between 1867-1877. Vincente de la Ossa's wife, Rita, survived her husband by more than 50 years and ran the Encino stop after his death. The de la Ossa family, a part of it at least, is reported to have moved to the Chatsworth area near the Devil's Slide in what is now the Santa Susana Pass State Historic Park, where they ran a stage relay station for stage coach travel. The Daughters of the American Revolution in their local history, record the family as the earliest settlers in the western part of the valley.

Part of the mystery surrounding the de la Ossa family in Chatsworth comes from historical records of the period which go no further than establishing a "Mountain Station" in the vicinity. There is no clear proof yet that the de la Ossa family - namely Rita and adopted daughter Mary Aiken - were at the station referred to as the "Mountain Station" in Quinn's Historical & Biographical Record, 1907, and Bancroft's Guide for Travelers by Rail, Stage, and Steam Navigation, 1869-1874." From some existing records, the "Mountain Station" might have been "Larry's Station", located on the Simi side, which operated during 1868 and later. However, there is other evidence that the "Mountain Station" was the de la Ossa relay station on the Chatsworth side below the Devil's Slide. Florence Webster, a local historian and authoress, many years ago conducted a taped interview with the late Mary Aiken, when Mary was 87 years of age. Ysidora Lechlider, one of the offspring of Vincente and Rita de la Ossa, was present at that interview. Both of them heard the story

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of "La Cuesta" (roughly translated, "the hill"), the relay station at the base of the Devil's Slide, where Mary and her adopted mother Rita de la Ossa lived and kept the station. Minnie Palmer, one of the last living pioneers of Chatsworth, recalls playing in the Devil's Slide area as a child. She also believes the relay station -- or a station where horses were changed after coming down the steep Devil's Slide grade -- was there.

Considering the foreboding Devil's Slide as well as the treacherous west side of the Santa Susana Pass, it is feasible that a well-equipped station existed on both sides for passengers and repairs.

Two foundations presently remain on the site, one of them up on a slope, and another a little bit to the southeast. The SSMPA believes the upper foundation with a large cistern near at hand is the de la Ossa relay station site. Clinkers, the remains of burned coal, have been uncovered at this upper site, suggesting that a forge was there. However, as the Bannon quarry and household later used that site, further investigation would be needed to determine the foundation's true origin.



Candidate for Ventura County Supervisor Seat Tours Local Neighborhood

James Dantona, candidate for Ventura County Supervisor, and Gary Selvaggio, California Neighborhood Union, met with interested residents of Box Canyon and Chatsworth Lake Manor on Sunday, February 19th, to view land alterations in and around those areas. Mr. Dantona is running for the seat currently held by Ms. Judy Mikels. Mr. Selvaggio belongs to a group known as CalUnion, which is actively supporting Mr. Dantona's election effort. CalUnion is also actively supporting Linda Parks' re-election campaign.

Chatsworth Trails Park

On Sunday, February 26th, Save Chatsworth, Inc. hosted a walk-through of the 13-acre Conservancy park that has been unofficially named "Chatsworth Trails Park". About 20 community members took a tour of the park area, listening to a presentation of the preliminary plans and ideas for restoration of the park's accessible areas, and then gave their own input and advice. In advance of this field trip, native landscape design professional Madena Asbell of L.A. Native Design toured the site and marked examples of native plants to leave alone, and weeds and invasive non-natives which could be removed.

The project plan is to maintain a natural park area used primarily by hikers and equestrians, and the initial work will consist of trash removal and some weed and brush clearance, in preparation for planting of additional California native plants next fall and winter.

The first work weekend took place Saturday & Sunday, March 11-12. The next one will be Saturday & Sunday, April 8-9


