### TROUBLE IN THE HILLS

Six days a week, beginning 2 years ago, neighbors along a private road in the Simi Hills noted numerous covered and uncovered trucks going up to a site and coming down empty, indicating the operation of an apparent unlicensed dump or landfill. The dumpsite is adjacent to a public open-space park operated by the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy. During 2005, Todd Doherty wrote about this operation by email to various agencies having enforcement capabilities, including Ventura County, California Integrated Waste Management Board, CA Fish & Game, Southern California Water Authority, the State Governor's office, and others with possible regulatory authority. Eventually, the Governor's office directed the County to review the allegations made. In May of 2006, the dump operator was issued an order to Cease and Desist from the County's Local Enforcement's Agency (an agency created to ensure compliance with environmental protection laws). Hearings have ensued on the matter, which are continuing presently.

In May 2006, two individuals organized demonstrations near the dumpsite and at the Ventura County Government center. The dump operator consequently filed a lawsuit suing participants in the small demonstration that was photographed at the Ventura County Government Center, as well as a Ventura County Supervisor candidate who had expressed public concerns about the dump activity, and others. Although 6 people and 50 DOES were named in the complaint that was filed in mid-June 2006, only two people have been served: (1) Todd Doherty, who has written most of the correspondence and was at the demonstrations, and (2) a neighbor of the dump operator. who is very familiar with the operations. Allegations in the lawsuit are primarily that Todd Doherty caused the investigation and public hearing process, due to his allegedly false statements and correspondence and telephonic activities, thereby causing damage to the dump operator's reputation, credibility and business, and causing emotional distress, pain and suffering and pecuniary loss "in a sum not less than one million dollars".



#### SLAPPs (Strategic Lawsuits Against Public Participation)

Generally, a "SLAPP" is a (1) civil complaint or counterclaim; (2) filed against individuals or organizations; (3) arising from their communications to government or speech on an issue of public interest or concern. SLAPPs are often brought by corporations, real estate developers, government officials and others against individuals and community groups who oppose them on issues of public concern.

SLAPP filers frequently use lawsuits based on ordinary civil claims such as defamation, conspiracy, malicious prosecution, nuisance, and interference with contract and/or economic advantage, as a means of transforming public debate into lawsuits.

Ultimately, most SLAPPs are not legally successful. Nevertheless, while most SLAPPs do not succeed in court, they "succeed" in the public arena. This is because defending a SLAPP, even when the legal defense is strong, requires a substantial investment of money, time, and resources. The resulting effect "chills" public participation in, and open debate on, important public issues. This chilling effect is not limited to the SLAPP defendants -- other people refrain from speaking out on issues of public concern because they fear being sued for what they say.

The filing of a SLAPP also impedes resolution of the public matter at issue, by removing the parties from the public decision-making forum, where both the cause and resolution of the dispute can be determined, and placing them before a court, where only the alleged "effects" of the public controversy may be determined. For example, imagine a company asks for a zoning variance to place an incinerator in a residential area. When local residents object to the city council, the company sues them for "interference with contract." The judge hearing the suit cannot decide the real issues -- the location of the incinerator -- but will have to spend considerable judicial resources to decide the side issues of the alleged "damages" or other consequences of the public debate on the real issues.

[NOTE: When a SLAPP-type lawsuit recently was filed against a SSMPA Board Member, we researched the issue on the internet, and found a website that includes a great deal of additional information at www.casp.net, which is operated by the California Anti-SLAPP Project (CASP), a public interest law firm and policy organization dedicated to protecting the rights of Californians to participate in government and civic affairs and to speak freely about public issues. A legal defense fund is being created to assist the defendants.]

Thank you for your continued cooperation, your concern, and your determination to preserve this unique cultural and historical heritage for our community and our children.


## Wetland Mapping Process Interactive Two-Day Open House

Interested in local wetlands? Mountains Restoration Trust is preparing Headwaters to Groundwater: Upper Los Angeles River Area Assessment Project, funded by Prop 50 CALFED Watershed Program. The maps cover the undeveloped sections of the Santa Susana Mountains, Simi Hills and Santa Monica Mountains west of the 405 Freeway in the LA River watershed. The Geography Dept. at Cal State University, Northridge, has been working on creating wetland maps using National Wetlands Inventory (NWI) methodology under the direction of Dr. Shawna Dark. This is an involved process that relies heavily on the interpretation of aerial photography. They have completed a first pass at the wetland maps, but nothing can replace the knowledge of local experts.

The maps will be available for review and comment from 9am to 5pm, Thurs., Sept. 14<sup>th</sup> and Fri., Sept. 15 at the office of Mountains Restoration Trust (see map).

Dr. Dark will hold a special program on **Thurs.**, **Sept. 14**<sup>th</sup> from **10am to 2pm.** A formal presentation of the methodology and what is needed will be presented during the first hour. Attendees will be invited to mark any missed or miscalculated wetlands on the maps.

Getting input in the form of stakeholder review has not been done on previous NWI maps, but now this will be a regular part of the wetland mapping process. Share this announcement with someone you know who might have knowledge of the areas being mapped.




